Fifty years ago, Maria Anna Bugeja, a Maltese lay missionary, came to Pakistan with a heart full of compassion. Her mission began in the overcrowded prisons of Lahore, where she witnessed the suffering of the forgotten, especially women prisoners. This life-changing moment marked the start of her extraordinary journey as Baji Maryam, a name now synonymous with kindness and selfless service.

On her first visit to Lahore's jails, Baji Maryam saw prisoners living in horrendous conditions. Many had lost their mental faculties, and women, in particular, were suffering without hope. She knew something had to be done and dedicated herself to their welfare.

Over the past five decades, Baji Maryam has devoted herself to helping marginalized women, children, and prisoners. She has freed hundreds from wrongful imprisonment, reunited families, and established shelter homes. Her quiet yet powerful efforts stretch across Punjab, KP, and Sindh.

Despite her monumental achievements, Baji Maryam has always avoided recognition. Even St. Mother Teresa invited her to join her congregation, but Baji continued her mission independently, never seeking applause or rewards.

After years of serving inmates, Baji Maryam realized that orphans and vulnerable disabled children also needed care and protection. With this conviction, she established Angel's Home, a sanctuary for disabled in Peshawar, ensuring that these children receive the love and support they deserve.

Angel's Home has become a pioneer organization for philanthropic services in the region, offering a safe haven for children with disabilities by providing them with shelter, education, and a nurturing environment. Baji Maryam's tireless efforts to support these children reflect her unshakable commitment to those in need.

To this day, Baji Maryam continues her work with humility and grace. Her visits to prisons and her ongoing dedication to reuniting ex-prisoners with their families show her deep empathy and desire to heal the broken. Her legacy of compassion lives on through Angel's Home, offering hope and a better future to the most vulnerable children in society.

Situated at just less than 30 kilometers from the Afghan border, Peshawar which was once called the City of Flowers is now known as one of the world's most dangerous cities and has borne the brunt of rising militancy in the region, fueled by the conflicts in neighboring Afghanistan.

The area is facing the fatal issues of terrorism, political instability, economic crisis, sectarian violence, intensified ferocity against religious minorities, natural and unnatural disasters, religious extremism, and poverty. The ratio of disability is increasing drastically in the region due to the presence of infectious diseases, poliovirus, bomb blasts, accidents, earthquakes, floods, current and emerging pandemics, a high ratio of cousin marriages, poor access to healthcare, and extreme poverty. Ground sources and first-hand experience of serving on the ground reveal that the no-go areas of southern districts including Bannu, Karak, North and South Waziristan, Tank, Lakki Marwat, and Dera Ismail Khan have a high ratio of disability which is hidden due to security, social and economic factors. Cultural taboos and beliefs often lead many to view disabilities as a curse thus they deny or hide disability. This situation particularly affects women and girls with disabilities, subjecting them to double discrimination.

Recognizing the crucial need for service delivery Angel's Home started its operations in 2022. Despite the immense need for such a facility in the province, we face complex challenges on multiple fronts including cultural and behavioural issues, extreme inflation, and trifling support from the state. Irrespective of the hurdles, the number of children seeking assistance continues to grow which fuels us to continue our efforts to bring about real change in the lives of these abandoned, marginalized disabled children.

Solely our efforts cannot bring the desired change in the lives of disabled people. We truly seek your contribution regarding finances, in-kind support, zakat, donations, or even time to serve better. I am forever grateful for the kindness and generosity of countless helping hands that have made our mission possible. I thank our government partners, stakeholders, individual donors, and organizations for their unwavering support and trust in our work. 


Objective

Half of the population of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's settled districts and 75% of the tribal districts are suffering from multidimensional poverty.




As per the UN disabled people are among the poorest in their communities.

Both disability and terrorism are big global phenomena that are major concern to all




Terrorist attacks cause civilians to lose sight, vision, and/or hearing.

Drug Abuse and Disability

Disability and addiction have a complex relationship, with each being a cause and effect of the other.



Addiction is a major contributing factor in the development of many disabilities.





Individuals under the influence are substantially more likely to suffer serious injury that can cause disability.



Certain forms of alcohol can cause blindness.



Substance abuse also worsens the symptoms of many mental and intellectual disorders, leading to more severe episodes and greater disability.



Inhalant use can cause nerve damage

Intravenous drug use is a major avenue through which several diseases that cause disability spread.



In Pakistan, an estimated 7 million individuals take drugs regularly. Among them, 4 million use cannabis, and 2.7 million use opiates.







Pakistan is one of the top 10 nations with the greatest prevalence of opioid addiction, according to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime




Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has the highest number of drug users in the country

Overview



To develop abilities and optimistic perceptions regarding disability through training & awareness in our staff and in society Angel's Home initiated its training department.




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Social Media

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Disability Impacts all of us!



Despite being one of the largest minority groups in the population, the visibility of persons with disabilities (PWDs) has been steadily wiped out of society. This is not just a baseless claim. Systematic discrimination can be observed from the 2017 population census, which under-estimated the prevalence of disability. On one hand, Human Rights Watch estimates that the number of people living with disabilities in Pakistan varies widely, from 3.3 million to 27 million. On the other hand, the state census of 2017 claims that only 0.44% of Pakistan's population is disabled, a drastic decrease compared to the 1998 census, which reported a disability rate of 2.38%. How unfortunate is it that a whole segment of the Pakistani population does not even exist in the official records of their own state? As the saying goes, "Out of sight, out of mind."

The same applies to the disabled population of Pakistan; with the denial of their existence, their rights are also being denied. Everyone is just one unfortunate incident away from falling prey to disability. If we are fortunate enough to live a long life, sooner or later, we will experience some form of disability. Whether we like to accept it or not, disability impacts all of us.

So, let us not hold back from showing up as allies and doing better. If you don't know where to start, reach out to Angel's Home, and together, we can work to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities.

Basis for Opinion

We are independent of the Organization in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants as adopted by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan (the Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

1 STATUS AND OPERATION

ANGEL'S HOME WELFARE ORGANIZATION (th Organization) is a non-profit organization working for social development of vulnerable and less developed people. The Organization has been working since 2022 in Peshawar, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. The Organization is registered with Social Welfare Department Peshawar under the social welfare Ordinance 1961 (Registration No:DSW/Khyber Pakhtunkhwa/5309, dated: June 01, 2023). The Organization has the mission to empowering marginalized communities through equitable, inclusive and holistic development programs. The registered office of the Organization is situated at Chamkani Chowk, Inkalab Road, Opposit Allied School, Peshawar.

2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of Accounting and Financial Reporting Standard for Small-Sized Entities (SSEs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan.

3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements has been prepared under the historical cost convention.

3.2 Functional and Presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Organization are measured and presented using the currency of the primary economic environment in which it operates (functional currency), which is Pakistani Rupee.

3.3 Significant accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with approved accounting standards requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgments in the process of applying adopted accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historic experience and other factors, including expectation of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. In the process of applying Organization's accounting policies, management has made the significant estimates and judgments that are disclosed in respective notes to the financial statements.

3.4 Taxation

Provision for taxation is based on taxable income at the current tax rates after taking into account applicable tax credits, rebates and exemption available under Income Tax Ordinance, 2001.

3.5 Foreign currency

Foreign currency transactions are recognized at the exchange rate applicable at the transaction date. Monetary assets and liabilities are translated into rupees using exchange rates applicable at the balance sheet date. Gains and losses on settlement and translation at the year end are recognized in the statement of financial activities

3.6 Plant and equipment

Property and equipment at are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment in value, if any.

Depreciation is charged to income applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in the property and equipment note.

Depreciation on additions during the year is charged from the month in which an asset is acquired or capitalized, while no depreciation is charged for the month in which the asset is

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted if impact on depreciation is significant.

Maintenance and normal repairs are charged to income as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized.

3.7 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for services rendered in the normal course of business.

- Profit on investments / bank deposits is recognized on time proportionate basis.

- Restricted grants

Grants received for specific purposes and interest thereon are classified as restricted grants. Such grants are transferred to income as grants to the extent of actual expenditure incurred against them. Unspent portion of such grants are reflected as restricted grants in the balance sheet. Expenditure incurred against grant committed but not received is accrued and recognized in income and is reflected as receivable from donors.

- Unrestricted grants

Unrestricted grants, if any, received from donor without any conditions are recognized as income during the year of receipt.

3.8 Cash and Cash equivalent

Cash and Cash equivalent in the statement of affairs comprise cash in hand and cash at bank in current and saving accounts.
